2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC	:	

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i) Preparation for Third cycle of accreditation:-

The prime target of IQAC this year is to prepare the SSR for the Third Cycle of accreditation to be completed in 2017. The steering committee was constituted for the year and the committee of departmental coordinators also constituted. The data collection for the preparation of SSR has been made and the SSR has been completed by the end of march 2017 and it was uploaded in the college website as required by the NAAC. The LOI also was sent for the same. The hard copies of SSR were sent in April 2017. The IQAC sought cooperation from the department and the office for the collection of data to be included in the SSR.

ii) Seminars and Workshops:-

IQAC initiated and organised several seminars and workshops this year to empower the Teaching and Administrative staffs. Two Seminars on service matters were conducted separately for Teachers and Non teaching staffs. One orientation on "Pursuit of Excellence" was conducted for the teachers. An International Cultural workshop and fest was organised very successfully in March 2017. The IQAC also motivated the departments to organise national/state level seminars and workshops and some of the departments conducted programs very effectively.

iii) Monitoring of Government supported skill based programs:-

The programs WWS (walk with the scholar), SSP (Scholar support programme), ASAP (Additional Skill Acquisition Programme), FLAIR (Fostering linkages in academic innovations and Research) etc, were monitored by IQAC and ensured effective and successful

conduct of these programs in this college. Considering the remoteness of the place and the comparatively less chances available to the students to extend out to further dimensions by interactions with achievers in every discipline, sessions by eminent personalities and motivational tours were suggested to WWS and as a result several sessions were conducted for the students. Weaker students benefited very much from SSP. IQAC is aware of the fact that it is important to nourish the academically weak but interested students from poor background are given ample attention. To uplift and promote them the Government has extended assistance and it is properly utilized by the college for such students and IQAC monitors the SSP activities and it is being carried out very effectively. ASAP was very effectively conducted by the college and our college is one of the best centres in the state in implementing the ASAP courses and programs. Two teachers attended programs under FLAIR.

IQAC has been functional in recommending various charitable and extension activities in the college by various organisations and clubs.

1.3 Feedback from stakeholders* (On all aspects)

Alumni

St. Mary's college, Sulthan Bathery has an excellent group of alumni who have excelled in all walks of life. Alumni association is happy in providing the best opportunity to the financially and academically backward students, especially the tribal students. The alumni association expressed their impressions in the conduct of several awareness classes' seminars and debates. The get together of alumni was conducted department and college wise for the creative involvement and self strengthening of the students. The association is of the opinion that programmes such as observance of Women's day, charity programmes anti drug programs etc were worthy to inculcate human values among the students and the young students are greatly motivated in this regard.

Employees

The Ministerial and teaching staff in the college expressed their happiness in being the part and parcel of the motivational visits and carrier guidance programmes conducted by the clubs and programmes. Also, the teachers reflected on the actual need of scholar support programme for the academically weak students. This helped them to understand the students in depth.

Students

The students are happy about the skilling programmes such as ASAP and DCA. Students express their impression on the WWS and SSP programmes as they benefited very much. They realised the need of this for getting good placements for them in the future. Moreover, they also suggested the need of such programmes subject wise also so that their employability can be enhanced. Most of the students expressed their high regard and contentment of most the teachers in their pursuit for knowledge, motivation and guidance given to the students in creative and extra-curricular activities as well as academic programmes. They are happy about the rapport among the teachers and students prevailing in the college.

PTA feedback

The PTA is concerned about the excessive use of drugs among the youth in the campuses and they want measures to be taken to prevent and protect students of the college and strengthen the anti drugs activities in the campus. They are pleased with the activities of the anti drugs club in the college. They also expressed their concern regarding the use of mobiles in the campus and remarked that it should be controlled in a healthy way. The importance given by the college on the Safety of the students in the college was well appreciated by PTA. Also, in a financially backward place like Wayanad, where many students starve to secure high education with half stomach and poor earnings, the college extended its kindness as special free noon meal programme for the needy students. On the same background, financial supports were extended to students to ensure their participation in competitive examinations outstations. PTA expressed their happiness in the regular review of these activities in the general and departmental meetings. The college responded actively and positively to the feedback. Actions were taken and changes were made based on the feedbacks

3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

The college collaborated with its sister concern, Karyambady eye hospital to conduct twelve eye camps in various places. Many poor patients were benefited. The college union, NCC, NSS, MGOCSM various departments of the college visited the destitute and old age homes nearby and provided food, provisions beds, financial supports and clothes to them. Few department and NSS conducted coaching classes to the children the nearby schools and tribal colony. The students in the college under NSS collect books to donate the nearby schools. The

NSS volunteers prepared a vegetable garden and planted more than hundred saplings. Usual blood detection and donation camps were arranged and prepared Blood Donors Directory The students of various organisation and department, teachers and non teaching staff collected fund for supporting the patients under treatment and for the house construction. Awareness campaign against forest fire and protection of Wild life In Muthanga was a public programme. NSS conducted flash mobs in public places in connection with cancer day and palliative day observance. They also conducted two awareness rallies in connection with plastic eradication and anti drugs programmes. Students were motivated to participate in palliative training classes at Calicut medical College. The teachers contribute considerable amount towards the charity activities of the management state wide. This year the college conducted Tree blood donation camp and also 125 students donated blood and published blood donor's directory. The students are mainly involved in pain and palliative care jointly with Panchayath pain and palliative care unit. NCC students also donate blood and they provided food in an old age home. NCC cadets constructed a bund in the nearby place to facilitate irrigation for farming MGOCSM also engage in spiritual and community developmental activities.

It gives information to students regarding the departments, academic curriculum, academic activities and other support services such as Placement Cell, Career Guidance Cell, various clubs, Counselling Cell, Women Development Cell, Leadership Academy, Grievance Redressal Cell, Alumni Association, Parent Teacher Association, Library, Extension activities, Free noon meal programmes, Walk with Scholar and Scholar Support Programmes, Bhoomithrasena Clubs etc. It also gives information to the students regarding the risk of getting involved in ragging and other antisocial activities. IQAC also encourages students to apply for the already available and new scholarships, upcoming competitive examinations, challenges. IQAC also conducted classes for the students, teachers and non teaching staffs on quality assurance and professional skills. And International Cultural Workshop and Fest was organised jointly with NSS in the college.
 - 2. The IQAC initiate and monitor the students' feedback and evaluation of the teachers and collects feedbacks from the students regarding these activities, analyse and solve issues or complaints raised. Also, this data is used for the modification of the various mechanisms in the college. The students are also involved in the discussions organized by the cell.
 - 3. The IQAC collects information regarding various activities such as seminars, conferences workshops, fests etc. and conveys this to the students for ensuring their participation. This enables the students and teachers to update their knowledge level in tune with the time.
 - 4. To motivate the creativity of the students and to help them in utilizing their time productively Notice board presentations are promoted and the best ones are given prizes too.
 - 5. The IQAC also collects information from placement cell, WWS, SSP, ASAP etc and identify the achievements and weakness of the students attending these programs. The cell suggests modifications and more effective methods in consultation with the coordinators concerned. The IQAC promote the teachers'/tutors' visit to the houses of students so that a better and healthy relationship could be build between the teachers and students and their parents.

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

An effective tutorial system is run by the college and the files are documented in the concerned departments. On the initial days itself the tutors provide them tutorial forms and get the family and academic details entered. At the end of every semester PTA meetings are held and discuss their progress with their parents. At the end of the course they will be enlisted in the alumni group and track their continuation in studies and the career positions. This will help find percentage of students' higher education as well as their jobs.

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Generally the syllabi were revised by the concerned board of studies of the affiliating university, in which four teachers from the college were members.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning.

Management is supportive to make the necessary infrastructure, library facilities and other e-resources and adequate number of computers to facilitate the learning process of the students. A new block is under construction as a Golden Jubilee Memorial Block. More effective

internet facilities are provided for the students. More renovnative work is planned such as tiling the departments, making ramps for physically challenged students, new parking area, entrance gate, net practicing centre for cricket and a model tribal huts etc which may be completed in two years

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The external examinations were conducted by the affiliating university as per university examination calendar and the college does not have any role in it other than providing the infrastructure and other facilities to conduct the examination. However, in the conduct of internal examinations and evaluations, college takes the role by providing challenging questions, giving new assignments, conduct projects on industrially important problems, evaluate the seminars taken by students etc.

6.3.4 Research and Development

UG and PG projects are conducted in the departments and in collaboration with other research labs and this data is documented and published.

As part of extending the science to the society, collaborative works between the various departments of the college and other industries were also carried out. The details are documented in the IQAC office.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library was automated by including bar codes to all the books. The helped the issue and return of a larger number of books on a daily basis. The interior of the library was modified by adding more furniture and other facilities. One more staff was appointed to the library for the smooth conduct of its activities. More number of computers with advanced configuration were purchased and installed. The college subscribe Inflibnet for the students and teachers. The library is planned to shifted to the new Jubilee Block with more facilities and accessory services.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Human Resource Management was conducted in the most efficient way. Their quality was maintained and improved by Academic and administrative audits.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Four teachers in the department of commerce and management studies were appointed this year. Five last grade staffs (LGS), one Computer Assistant were appointed in the office this year and also one Technical staff appointed in BCA department. For the self financing courses and regular course a few guest lecturers were also appointed.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Industry Interaction was carried out by various departments in connection with the UG and PG projects.

The admission of students for UG and PG courses was conducted by the affiliating university as per university and state rules by a single window process which ensures equal opportunity to all applicants. The verification of the required qualification for admission was verified by the various departments in the institution at the time of admission. The PTA of the college continues to make commendable contributions in this academic year as well. Department-wise PTA meetings were conducted twice every year to discuss the progress made by the students in studies and to report the external examination results. Parent – Teacher Association executive meetings were conducted seven times in a year and general body meeting was held once in a year. PTA financially supported minor academic activities and encouraged sports and arts activities in the college. From the PTA funds, it is decided to purchase a telescope for the department of physics. It is planned that the telescope can be used for the students in the college and the students in the neighbouring schools and the public. In order to meet the various demands of the needy and deserving students a good amount was set apart from the PTA fund.

A general body meeting of the PTA was held on 13/07/2016 during that meeting PTA scholarship and various endowments were distributed to the students who excelled in studies, arts, sports games and extracurricular activities. The usual annual general body meeting of the PTA was conducted in March 2017 and sent off was accorded to the retiring staffs

6.13 Development programmes for support staff

Training programs were conducted for the support staffs to improve their efficiency and effectiveness. Family get together was also conducted in connection with the sent off of the retiring staffs.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly

The Nature club and Bhoomithrasena are formed to initiate and promote environmental protection activities and to make the campus Eco friendly. This year also we planted more than two hundred saplings in and around the campus and they are properly nourished and protected. Under these clubs the waste in the campus is properly managed by putting waste bins at different places where the waste is usually accumulated. The NSS units also contribute remarkably in this regard. The college has got two rain harvesting tanks one in the college premises and one in the ladies hostel premises.

As in the previous years the college promotes organic poly house farming and open place farming near the ladies hostel. The products are used for the students in the hostel and the staff and the remaining vegetables are sold to the public. Several environmental awareness programs were also conducted this year. The campus is famous for its greenery and cleanliness and it is quite eco friendly. Several awareness classes, campaigns and rallies were conducted among the students and the public.

7. Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

All the innovations and best practices in the college are being maintained since they ensure the quality of the institution on this academic year. Also, we have thought of some innovative programmes and best practices which would contravene to the goodwill of the college. We concentrated on the major best practices – the environmental conscious and the community empowerment. Several programmes were conducted in this regard by the departments, Bhoomithrasena, NSS and NCC. A few of them are construction of bund, tree plantations organic vegetable farming, waste management rain harvesting plastic eradication etc.

- (i) Considering the need of safe guarding and empowering the women, the activities of the Women Development cell were taken care of. The Principal and the management extended the maximum support in this regard as in the previous years. Awareness program for the women students on various topics were conducted. Ladies hostel was monitored and redressed its problems. The WDC organized "She markets" for displaying and selling the various products made by the women students. They also published a manuscript magazine.
- (ii) To cater the physical and mental health of the students and the staff, the gymnasium is functioning effectively in the college. The students of the volleyball academy, sports students and other students and the staff make use of this gymnasium.
- (iii) The college union programme- ARDRAM- a Noon meal charity programme has been very effectively carried out this year also. It is a commendable social service project. The students of various departments would bring an extra packet of food by turn and the packets are collected and distributed in the nearby tribal colonies for the poor old age and invalid people there. They initiated a Haritha campus by planting trees and cleaning the campus. Jointly with NSS and Bhoomithrasena

7.2 Provide the Action Taken Report (ATR) based on the plan of action decided upon at the beginning of the year.

Activities of Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP) and Diploma in Computer Application by the Cell for Continuing Education - Kerala (CCEK) were fruitful to inspire the students to focus towards acquiring better command of the English language, communication skills and other soft skills. Actions taken in this regard improved the overall confidence of the students.

Actions taken to improve the e-learning of the students as well as teachers, in fact exposed both communities to novel fields in their respective discipline.

Also, the activities based on environmental awareness and climate change improved the social responsibility of the student and teacher community to keep the environment clean and plastic free. Better waste management practices by separating degradable and non-biodegradable wastes and circulating the non-biodegradable waste to production cycle in factories were noteworthy.

Special care given individually to academically weak and strong students through two programmes Scholar Support Programme (SSP) and walk with Scholar (WWS) catered the special needs of these two categories of students successfully.

Various activities to improve the mental health of the students by the activities of Health club and Anti-drug club were very relevant for the time of increasing alcohol and drug abuse and increasing number of teenagers getting involved in anti-social activities. The gymnasium in the college very effectively used.

- As the college progresses by its continuous interaction its stakeholders and working shoulder
 to shoulder with aspirations of various sections of the society, the changing climate,
 increase in problems due to decreasing water resources and ever increasing environmental
 pollutions, special programmes and awareness classes and other activities were conducted
 by various departments.

An increase in the consumption of alcohol and drug abuse, suicides and suicide attempts were noticed mainly by teenagers in the state as a whole, unique programmes were conducted to improve the mental health of the students. This included counselling; daily monitoring by the tutors and talks by experts other than these the Anti Drug club in the college conducted awareness programmes and competitions in the college

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection:

The environmental activities are geared by the NSS units, NCC and Bhoomithrasena in the college. With the objective of protecting Environment, 200 saplings

were planted in the premises of the campus and villages nearby. Plastic eradication Programme and awareness seminar and rallies were organized in our college as a part of this. The Principal, Programme Officer and 150 volunteers attended the rally Walkathon, from Sulthan Bathery to Muthanga. One Student One Tree programme was conducted. More than 200 saplings were distributed among the students to plant at their own farms and residential areas. Awareness campaign against forest fire, protection of wild animals and protection of human being from wild animals were conducted under the auspices of NSS. Along with this, volunteers collected plastic waste from surrounding areas of the forest. On June 5th, World Environment Day was observed. We conducted a Quiz on Nature, Ecology and Environment. Participants were given certificates and prizes. The NCC organized trekking to experience nature and planted saplings of fruit plants in the forest.
