i) Preparation for Third cycle of accreditation and NAAC Visit:-		

The prime target of IQAC this year was to prepare for the NAAC Peer Team Visit for the Third Cycle of accreditation to be completed in September 2017. The steering committee was constituted for the year and the committee of departmental coordinators also constituted. Various Committees were constituted for the purpose. IQAC conducted 3 Mock Visits as part of Preparation for the Visit. The IQAC sought cooperation from the department and the office for the successful conduct of the Peer Team Visit. The Team Visited the College on 25and 26 September 2017. And the college was reaccredited with 'A' Grade (3.08)

ii) Seminars and Workshops:-

IQAC initiated departmental several seminars and workshops this year Since IQAC was busy with the NAAC Peer Team Visit we could not conduct seminars and workshops other than the IQAC related Programs. The IQAC also motivated the departments to organise national/state level seminars and workshops and some of the departments conducted programs very effectively.

iii) Monitoring of Government supported skill based programs:-

The programs WWS (walk with the scholar), SSP (Scholar support programme), ASAP (Additional Skill Acquisition Programme), FLAIR (Fostering linkages in academic innovations and Research) etc, were monitored by IQAC and ensured effective and successful conduct of these programs in this college. Unfortunately the Government is not granting the fund for WWS and SSP and much programmes could not be conducted. IQAC is aware of the fact that it is important to nourish the academically weak but interested students from poor background are given ample attention. ASAP was very effectively conducted by the college and our college is one of the best centres in the state in implementing the ASAP courses and

programs.IQAC has been functional in recommending various charitable and extension activities in the college by various organisations and clubs.

Alumni

They conducted three meetings in connection with the peer team visit and participated in the alumni meeting during the visit. Employees

The Ministerial and teaching staff in the college actively involved in the peer team visit and gave full support to IQAC in making the peer team visit a great success. 3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

The college union, NCC, NSS, MGOCSM, Anti Drugs Club and various departments of the college engaged in various service activities in the community around. The students and teachers visited the destitute and old age homes nearby as usual and provided food, provisions beds, financial supports and clothes to them. The NSS conducted coaching classes to the children the nearby schools and tribal colony. The students in the college under NSS collect books to donate the nearby schools. NSS unit has conducted a hair donation camp in the college in collaboration with Sreyas, Sulthan Bathery, to support cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy.NSS volunteers has identified 11 hair donors from the campus and they had donated hair in the camp. The NSS volunteers prepared a vegetable garden and planted more than hundred saplings. A Survey to identify the dropout students and to trace out the exact reasons in Kuppadi village was conducted. Usual blood detection and donation camps were arranged and prepared Blood Donors Directory The students of various organisation and department, teachers and non

teaching staff collected fund for supporting the patients under treatment and for the house construction. Tree plantation, House construction, SWATCH BHARATH ABHIYAN, etc. also are aimed at the social amelioration they also conducted two awareness rallies in connection with plastic eradication and anti drugs programmes. Students were motivated to participate in palliative training classes at Calicut medical College. The teachers contribute considerable amount towards the charity activities of the management state wide and the House Construction Project. This year the college conducted blood donation camps and a good number of students donated blood and published blood donor's directory. The students are mainly involved in pain and palliative care jointly with Panchayath pain and palliative care unit. NCC students also donate blood and they provided food in an old age home. **Criterion – IV**

5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services

1. The IQAC in the college is keen to provide maximum support to the students in their academic, extracurricular activities, skill and career development areas. It gives information

to students regarding the departments, academic curriculum, academic activities and other support services such as Placement Cell, Career Guidance Cell, various clubs, Counselling Cell, Women Development Cell, Leadership Academy, Grievance Redressal Cell, Alumni Association, Parent Teacher Association, Library, Extension activities, Free noon meal programmes, Walk with Scholar and Scholar Support Programmes, Bhoomithrasena Clubs etc. It also gives information to the students regarding the risk of getting involved in ragging and other antisocial activities. IQAC also encourages students to apply for the already available and new scholarships, upcoming competitive examinations, challenges. IQAC also conducted classes for the students, teachers and non teaching staffs on quality assurance and professional skills

2. The IQAC initiate and monitor the students' feedback and evaluation of the teachers and collects feedbacks from the students regarding these activities, analyse and solve issues or complaints raised. Also, this data is used for the modification of the various mechanisms in the college. The students are also involved in the discussions organized by the cell.

3. The IQAC collects information regarding various activities such as seminars, conferences workshops, fests etc. and conveys this to the students for ensuring their participation. This enables the students and teachers to update their knowledge level in tune with the time.

4. To motivate the creativity of the students and to help them in utilizing their time productively Notice board presentations are promoted and the best ones are given prizes too.

5. The IQAC also collects information from placement cell, WWS, SSP, ASAP, Anti Drugs Club etc and identify the achievements and weakness of the students attending these programs. Unfortunately the Government stopped the funding temporarily for the WWS and SSP. The cell suggests modifications and more effective methods in consultation with the coordinators concerned. The IQAC promote the teachers'/tutors' visit to the houses of students so that a better and healthy relationship could be build between the teachers and students and their parents.

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

An effective tutorial system is run by the college and the files are documented in the concerned departments. At the end of every semester PTA meetings are held and discuss their progress with their parents. At the end of the course they will be enlisted in the alumni group and track their continuation in studies and the career positions. This will help find percentage of students' higher education as well as their jobs. There are departmental level efforts to trace the students passing out and their pursuit in higher studies and career.

The student support programmes function effectively in the college. Coaching for competitive examinations is conducted by the corresponding cell coordinated by the teacher in charge as coordinator. Also, the institute provides a platform for conducting the coaching classes offered by other leading institutions, as part of their extension works. The College conduct Leadership training, debates, Quizzes, awareness programmes etc. by the departments and external agencies under the auspicious of IQAC Also, the college encourages the initiation of activities of government centres, such as Centre for Continuing Education, Kerala (CCEK). 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Generally the syllabi were revised by the concerned board of studies of the affiliating university, in which four teachers from the college were members.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning.

Management is supportive to make the necessary infrastructure, library facilities and other e-resources and adequate number of computers to facilitate the learning process of the students. A new block is under construction as a Golden Jubilee Memorial Block. More effective internet facilities are provided for the students. More renovnative work is planned such as tiling the departments, making ramps for physically challenged students, new parking area, entrance gate, net practicing centre for cricket and a model tribal huts etc which may be completed in two years

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The external examinations were conducted by the affiliating university as per university examination calendar and the college does not have any role in it other than providing the infrastructure and other facilities to conduct the examination. However, in the conduct of internal examinations and evaluations, college takes the role by providing challenging questions, giving new assignments, conduct projects on industrially important problems, evaluate the seminars taken by students etc.

UG and PG projects are conducted in the departments and in collaboration with other research labs and this data is documented and published.

The college subscribe Inflibnet for the students and teachers. The library is under the process of shifting to the new Jubilee Block with more facilities and accessory services.

One new teacher in the department of political science was appointed this year. For the self financing courses and regular course a few guest lecturers were also appointed.

The association whole heartedly supported with their presents and involvements in the NAAC visit process.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

The PTA of the college actively and positively involves in the all round development and made commendable contributions in this academic year as well. Department-wise PTA meetings were conducted twice every year to discuss the progress made by the students in studies and to report the external examination results. Parent – Teacher Association executive meetings were conducted seven times in a year and general body meeting was held once in a year. PTA financially supported minor academic activities and encouraged sports and arts activities in the college even by providing fund. In order to meet the various demands of the needy and deserving students a good amount was set apart from the PTA fund. The PTA very actively involved in the NAAC re- accreditation process during the peer team visit.

A general body meeting of the PTA was held in July 2017. During the meeting PTA scholarship and various endowments were distributed to the students who excelled in studies, arts, sports games and extracurricular activities. The usual annual general body meeting of the PTA was conducted in March 2018 and sent off was accorded to the retiring teaching and ministerial staff.

6.13 Development programmes for support staff

Training programs were conducted for the support staffs to improve their efficiency and effectiveness. Family get together was also conducted in connection with the sent off of the retiring staffs.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly

The Nature club and Bhoomithrasena are function effectively to initiate and promote environmental protection activities and to make the campus Eco friendly. This year also we planted more than two hundred saplings in and around the campus and they are properly nourished and protected. Under these clubs the waste in the campus is properly managed by putting waste bins at different places where the waste is usually accumulated. The NSS and NCC units also contribute remarkably in this regard by planting and preserving saplings. The college has got two rain harvesting tanks one in the college premises and one in the ladies hostel premises. College maintains campus neat, tidy and green.

As in the previous years the college promotes organic poly house farming and open place farming near the ladies hostel. The products are used for the students in the hostel and the staff and the remaining vegetables are sold to the public. Several environmental awareness programs were also conducted this year.

Actions taken in this regard improved the overall confidence of the students.

Library is in the process of shifting to the new Jubilee Block. Actions taken to improve the e-learning of the students as well as teachers.

The construction of the Amphitheatre is in progress. Various activities are undertaken by NSS, NCC WDC etc. to promote the extension activities. The college also monitors the activities of various clubs to promote the overall development of stake holders.

With the objective of protecting Environment, more than 200 saplings were planted in the premises of the campus and villages nearby. Awareness campaign against forest fire, protection of wild animals and protection of human being from wild animals were conducted under the auspices of NSS. . On June 5th, World Environment Day was observed. We conducted a Quiz on Nature, Ecology and Environment. Participants were given certificates and prizes. The NCC organized SWATCH BHARATH ABHIYAN and planted saplings
